Vampires are the problem!

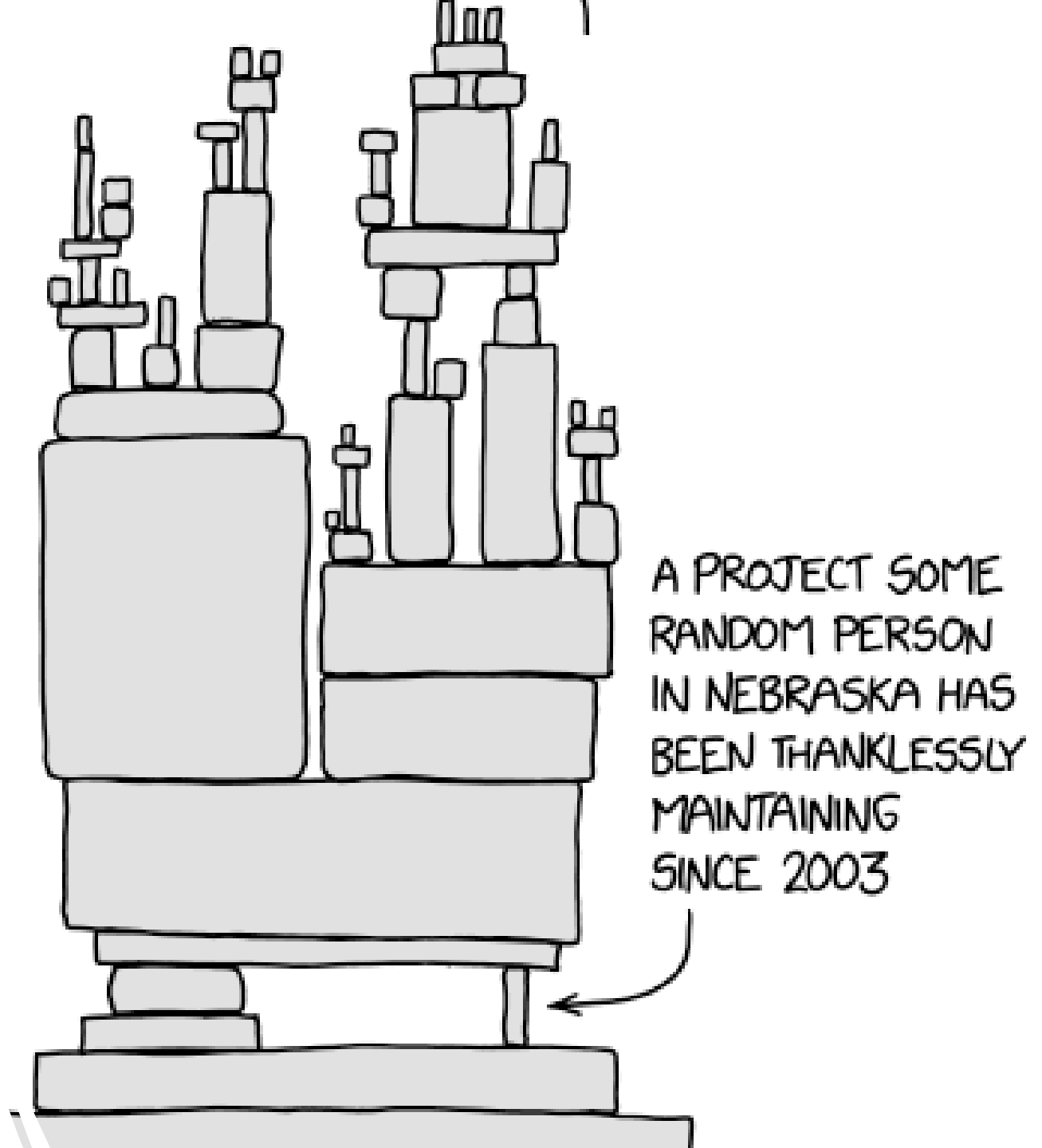
- They suck your job for their benefit

- 10° DEC – Attacks begin
- One year later: 50% of the vulnerable servers are still there, **unpatched...**





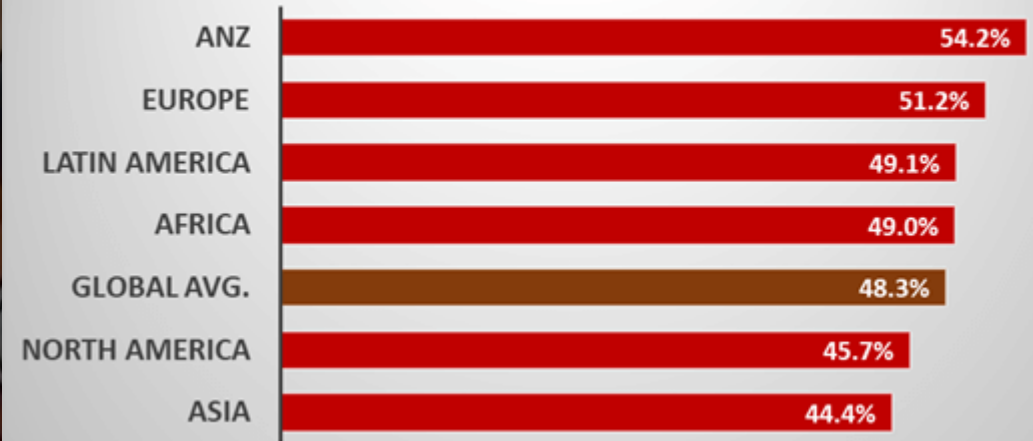
It's time for PANIC

- 2/3 of all servers analyzed by Akamai were running a vulnerable Log4J instance
- 91% of the data centers analyzed were executing server side Java apps
- More than 40% of those servers were connected to the Internet

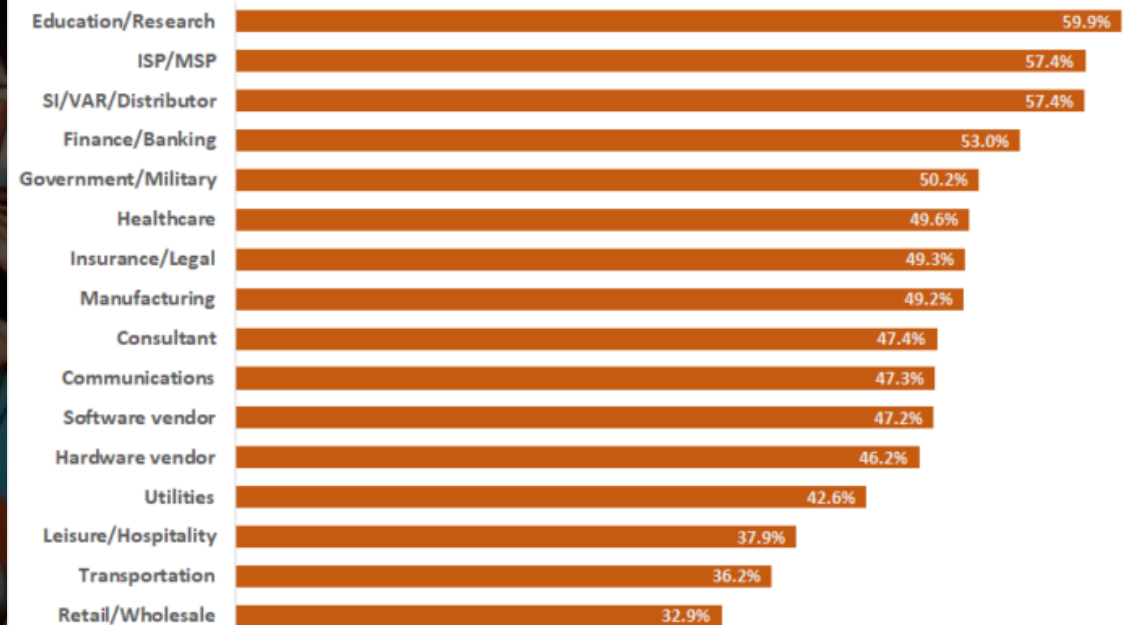
It's time for PANIC

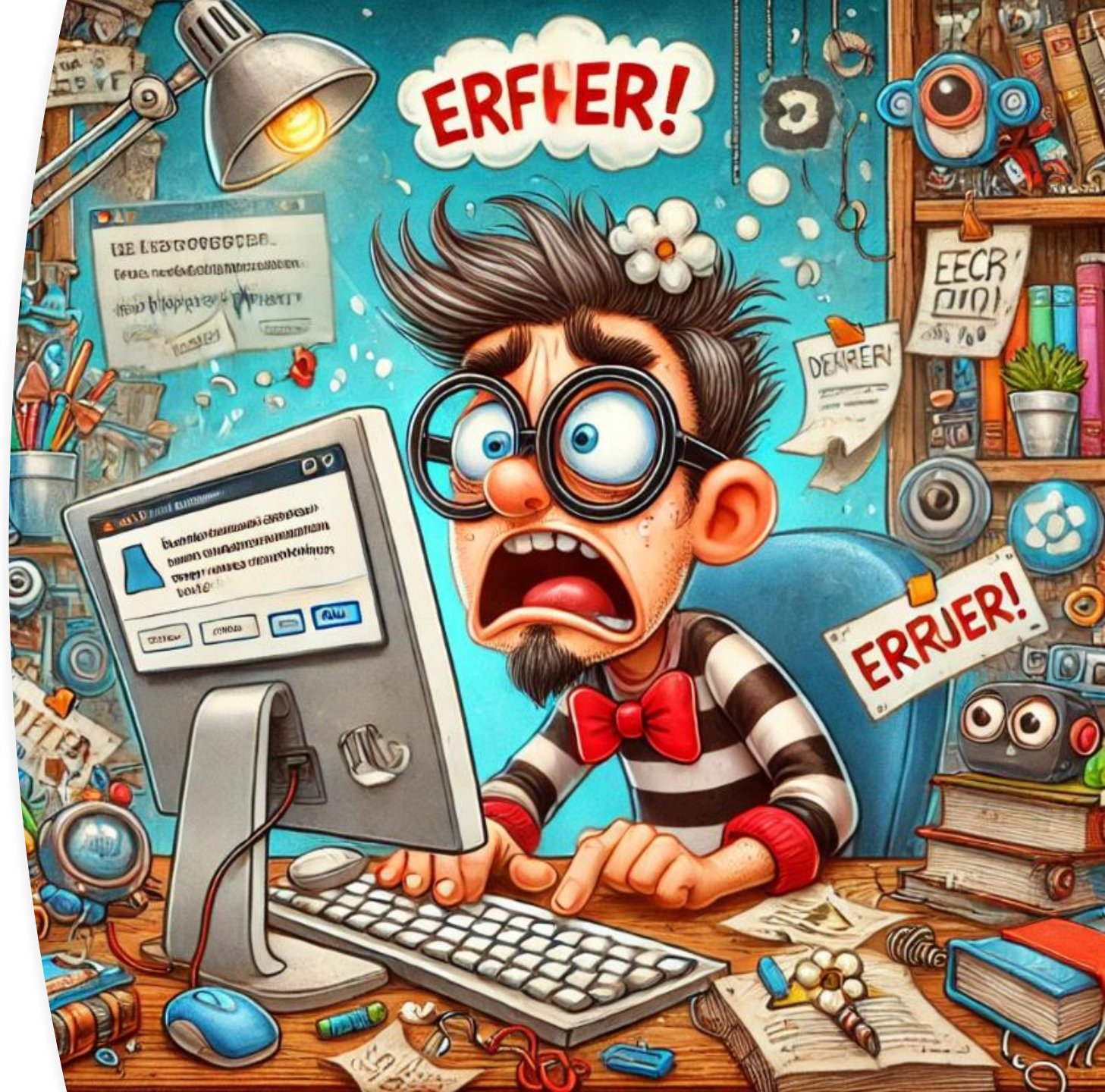
- Looks like we can't learn
