


Lawmakers meet with the Open Source community, build bridges and learn, this is reflected in legislation and implementation efforts.




Why the Community had to mobilise

- A lack of knowledge/understanding of FOSS







What has changed?




- Lawmakers contact us now

- Open Source is understood to be inherantly valuable












What is next?




- Al Liability Directive -> Software Liability?

It's 2022 in Brussels, and a young, naive policy advisor is finishing his first negotiation.


As the meeting comes to a close, the lead negotiator asks if there is any other business.


The advisor raises his hand and asks, "what about Open Source?". Little does he know, he's about to create a lot of problems for a lot of people.

What Happened next?






What is in the OSI definition

- 4 Freedoms (Use, Study, Modify, Share)
- Sharing of:
 - Complete Source code for data processing, training, use
 - Model Parameters
 - Training Data + Data Information
 - List of publicly available training data
 - List of non-public available data
 - Full Description of unsharable data
